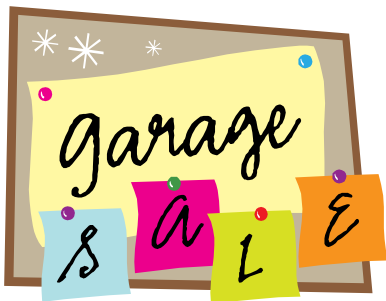

Community Update by Charles Wilfong

The American Ev. Lutheran Church at 1830 W. Glenrosa Ave. is in the process of becoming the Redemption Alhambra Village non-denominational church. On January 26th, 2014, the Lutheran church voted to cede its property to Redemption. Pastor Charles Schmitz held the first church service at American in 1948, in the farm house, which became the pastor's residence. As soon as the dairy barn--now the day care center an pre-school--was remodeled, services were held there. In 1951, American dedicated the church sanctuary. In the early 1960's, the gymnasium was built and years later the modular units were added. Martin Luther School held classes in the buildings for 38 years and closed about 3 years ago. Pastor Charles Wilfong--who joined American Lutheran in 1949 as a young boy--held the last Lutheran service on February 2, 2014. Redemption began holding services on February 9, 2014 and will continue its ministry there under the leadership of Pastor Aaron Dailey. Bel Air Neighborhood Association has had a close relationship with the church over the years, holding many of its meetings and functions there.

Neighborhood College by Virginia Anders

The City of Phoenix has established a program called Neighborhood College, which is a wonderful way to learn about City services, and learn practical information on a wide variety of issues. The Bel Air newsletter will feature examples of what they cover. Here is an example that took place last fall. From what I've seen, there aren't any regular fees for signing up.

Neighborhood College is a series of workshops that provides participants with information about city programs, services and resources, presented by multiple city departments. They provide the tools to access those resources, the skills, and ideas with which to build positive, sustainable communities.

RESIDENTS INVITED TO LEARN HOW TO MAKE THEIR HOMES HEALTHY AND ENERGY EFFICIENT

Did you know that your home plays a significant role in your health? Home accidents kill one person every 16 minutes and injure one person every four seconds in the United States. Dust and contaminants, property maintenance, water issues, pests and more can affect the well-being of you and your family.

As part of Neighborhood College, the city's Neighborhood Services Department is hosting a workshop called "Is Your House Healthy and Energy Efficient?" from 6 to 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 26, at the Broadway Heritage Neighborhood Resource Center, 2405 E. Broadway Road. Participants will learn simple ways to help make their home healthier and more energy efficient, including the Seven Principles of a Healthy Home, sustainability practices and weatherization. Energy efficient giveaways, such as CFL light bulbs, will be available.

Bel Air is involved in a couple of activities with other neighborhoods. One of them is called Neighborhood Leadership, which is a quarterly meeting of representatives from other, nearby neighborhoods, such as St. Gregory's, Pasadena, and Melrose. There are usually ten or so participants. We share information, ideas, complaints, and resources. We gathered for the first year in Mountain View Precinct's meeting room. AJ Marsden, from Pasadena, shared this story after one meeting about a month ago.

"Here's what happened to me on the way home Sunday night....

I saw an "abandoned" bike on my way home this evening at 17Ave and Camelback (after working the Home Show as PBWAB, which was very FUN). I called it in to Crime Stop and stayed with the bike about 15 minutes. In that time, 2 other people wanted to "re-steal" the bike. It was getting too dark, so I rode on home. The "instant" I crossed the street, the bike was "re-stolen." I called Crime Stop to cancel the call since the bike was no longer where I reported it but was being taken west on Camelback. The call taker told me that the bike may not have been "re-stolen;" the owner may have just came back and got it. I almost said, "Whatever." I thought about bringing the bike along with me to my house to keep it there until an officer could pick it up. But, THAT would have looked VERY BAD."

In other words, sometimes our best efforts are frustrating, but they matter. If you see something that worries you, report it.

CommunityAwareness National Senior Independence Month

National Senior Independence Month is a good time to evaluate current living situations, noticing the strengths and weaknesses in daily routines and making adjustments for a better lifestyle in the home of an older Arizonan. Ask the questions: What is holding someone back? What could make daily living easier for them? Minor adjustments now can make a big difference in someone's life. Here are a few simple and helpful home safety tips:

- Make sure every room is well lit and make any lighting replacements where needed. Night lights throughout the house can help improve nighttime visibility and prevent trips and falls over unseen objects.
- Keep floors and walkways clear of unnecessary items, such as clothes, books, papers and trash.
- Something as simple as shifting furniture can be valuable for those who may have balance issues. Be careful as moving furniture can also create challenges for those who are sight impaired until they learn the new layout.
- Install grab bars and handrails in the bathrooms near the shower, bathtub and toilet. Using non-slip mats and placing double-sided tape under rugs can also help minimize slips.
- Everything should be easily accessible, including the refrigerator, cabinets, drawers, doors and shelving. Place items on lower levels of shelves for easier reach.

CommunityAssistance Free income tax assistance

The VITA Program generally offers free tax help to people who make \$52,000 or less and need assistance in preparing their own tax returns. IRS-certified volunteers provide free basic income tax return preparation with electronic filing to qualified individuals in local communities.

They can inform taxpayers about special tax credits for which they may qualify such as Earned Income Tax Credit, Child Tax Credit, and Credit for the Elderly or the Disabled. VITA sites are generally located at community and neighborhood centers, libraries, schools, shopping malls, and other convenient locations.
