Congratulations to our neighborhood and a BIG thanks to the 1997 Block Watch Grant Committee, Tim Blevins, Clara Wolf, Bill Heedy, Nancy Chambers, Marie Chapple-Camacho and Lori Boukatch. Bel Air Neighborhood Association was awarded a \$4,419 grant for the 1997-1998 budget year. The \$4,419 was requested to continue our efforts at keeping the neighborhood informed and involved. and contributing to the quality of life for our residents. The grant will pay for our newsletter, meeting notices, meeting room General charges for Meetings, event flyers, insurance, event cell phone charges for Block Watchers on Patrol, and Hotline phone charges.



The June 14, 1997 Board Meeting was called to order at 9:08 a.m. at the home of Susie Folz. The minutes and the treasurer's reports were approved as written.

#### **Old Business**

**1996 Block Watch Grant** – Due to a time constraint, we were not able to reallocate money from the grant. We were able to purchase the following: 10 metal signs with Bel Air printed in Green for our 10 A-frames, three rolls of stamps, business cards printed with the Hotline number, 500 business card size magnets (The Hotline cards will be attached to the magnets and will be given to residents.), poster board, foam-core boards, markers, paper and toner for the copier.

**Hotline Phone Number** – We will be changing the Hotline number in July. We have found a carrier who will provide service for approximately half the amount we currently pay. We'll let you know the number as soon as possible.

Advertising in the Newsletter – We are currently working on a form for Newsletter ads. The form will include the following information: how the ad will read, when it will run, and how much it will cost. Ads will be paid for in advance, so the form will also be the customer's receipt.

#### **New Business**

**1997 Block Watch Grant** – We have been awarded a 1997 Block Watch Grant. We will receive \$4,419.00, which is the full amount we asked for. Betty Dales and Clara Wolf will pick up the check June 21, 1997.

**National Night Out** – A Progressive Picnic is being planned for National Night Out. There will be stations set up around the neighborhood for you to visit. Starting with the Appetizer Station, you will proceed through the neighborhood until you reach the Ice Cream Station.

**Fall Festival** – The first weekend in November is a busy weekend in Phoenix, so we are changing the date of the Fall Festival. We're changing the theme, too. Look for more information in future Newsletters.


#### **Neighborhood Crime Stats**

**Correction:** The crime stats given in the May newsletter, identified as April stats, were actually 1997 crimes through the month of April. We apologize for our error.

We will continue providing this information on a regular basis. This information is given not to scare you, but to alert you to the problems facing our neighborhood and the neighborhoods nearby. These are the crime stats for the month of May 1997. Our area is 19th Avenue to 15th Avenue between Indian School Road and Campbell Avenue. During May we had 0 homicides, 0 sexual assaults, 0 gang related crimes, 0 robberies, 0 aggravated assaults, 5 burglaries, 5 thefts, 4 auto thefts, 0 drug crime and 1 domestic violence crime. All total we had 160 calls for service in the month of May. This number represents the number of telephone calls to the police department, not the number of incidents.

How do we compare to our adjacent neighborhoods? In the ranking of crime in this report #1 is worst and #185 is the best. This month we ranked 105th. To the North, 19th Avenue to 15th Avenue, Campbell to Camelback ranks 14th. To the South, 19th Avenue to 15th Avenue, Indian School Road to Osborn ranks 106th. To the East, 15th Avenue to 7th Avenue, Indian School Road to Campbell Avenue ranks 59th. To the West, 19th Avenue to 23rd Avenue, Indian School Road to Campbell Avenue ranks 3rd.

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
#### **Block Watch Captains Needed**

Heard about the City's Block Watch Program? We are not referring to our Block Watchers on Patrol. We are referring to the original program started by the city of Phoenix, to help deter crime in neighborhoods like ours. This program encourages neighbors to watch out for neighbors in their immediate area. The concept of the program is very simple. People need to become familiar with the houses that they can see from their own property and be able to recognize when something is out of the ordinary.

To date we have not had enough success in initiating this program in our neighborhood. The Association Board Members have divided the neighborhood into 12 zones. These zones were presented to the neighborhood at our general meetings and at our Fall Festival information booth. We need a volunteer to be a Block Watch Captain for each of these zones. The map below shows the 12 zones.

The Block Watch Captain must be willing to contact the people in their zone, communicate the problems we are dealing with, and explain how to watch for and report crimes. They would be responsible for setting up the initial orientation meeting with the Phoenix Police Department and being a liaison between their neighbors and the Association Board.
