

The July 12, 1997 Board Meeting was called to order at 9:04 a.m. at the home of Nancy Chambers. The minutes and the treasurer's reports were approved as written.

Old Business

1997 Block Watch Grant – Betty and Clara picked up the check. So far we have paid for the new Hotline number and for printing the July Newsletter.

National Night Out – The event will take place from 6 to 8:30 p.m. There will be four stops: Appetizers, Hot Dogs, and Ice Cream (the fourth stop is undetermined at this time). There will be water and soda at each stop. We have door prizes to give away. You can collect a door prize ticket at each stop.

Fall Festival – Plans are proceeding for the Fall Festival. It will be held November 8. The committee is in the process of determining the location and theme for the Festival.

The Information Corner

Begin putting things out for uncontained trash pick-up after August 9th, but no later than August 24th. You can put out the following yard waste: tree limbs, branches and stumps less than 4 feet long and 12 inches in diameter, palm fronds-any length, bagged grass, leaves, twigs and hedge clippings. Other items that will be picked up are washers, dryers, stoves, and water heaters. Discarded furniture, TVs, stereos, carpeting will also be picked up. The city WILL NOT PICK UP the following items: asphalt, bricks, dirt, broken concrete, concrete blocks, rocks, roofing material, refrigerators, freezers, heat pumps, dehumidifiers, water coolers, tires, car parts, lumber or wood longer than 4 feet and more than 12 inches in hazardous diameter. and waste.

Neighborhood Crime Stats

These are the crime stats for the month of June, 1997. Our area is 19th Avenue to 15th Avenue between Indian School Road and Campbell Avenue. During June we had 0 homicides, 0 sexual assaults, 0 gang related crimes, 0 robberies, 0 aggravated assaults, 10 burglaries, 2 thefts, 1 auto thefts, 1 drug crime and 0 domestic violence crime. All Total we had 128 calls for service in the month of June. This number represents the number of phone calls to the police department, not the number of incidents.

How do we compare to our adjacent neighborhoods? In the ranking of crime in this report #1 is worst and #199 is best. This month we ranked 105th. To the North, 19th Avenue to 15th Avenue, Campbell to Camelback ranks 11th. To the South, 19th Avenue to 15th Avenue, Indian School Road to Osborn ranks 106th. To the East, 15th Avenue to 7th Avenue, Indian School Road to Campbell Avenue ranks 62nd. To the West 19th Avenue to 23rd Avenue, Indian School Road to Campbell Avenue ranks 3rd.

Remember to report any suspicious activity. Call 911 for emergencies. Call Crime Stop at 262-6151.
