The September 11, 1999 Board Meeting was held in the Fireside Room at Martin Luther School, 1830 W. Glenrosa. The meeting was called to order at 9:16a.m.

Members present were Rick Jackal. Anna Blevins, Maureen Kelly, Todd Brueshoff, Laurel Moran, Sharon Barger and Pastor Charles Wilfong. Members absent were Jeannie Garcia, Betty Dales, Tom Bentley, Georgia Thomas and Carol Adamson.

The secretary's report was accepted as written. Treasurer's reports for the General Fund and 301 Grant were approved as submitted.

Fall Festival Update - Anna reported that the committee has been busy meeting. The focus of the festival will be on kids. Various businesses are donating pizzas and sub sandwiches for the main part of the meal. neighbors will be asked to bring a dessert or side dish. The committee is seeking \$375 for the festival. The board had discussed using the \$250 from the Westwood Neighborhood Association to go toward kid's entertainment at the festival. The rest will be used to cover the other costs. There wasn't any opposition to this idea.

301 Projects - It was decided to hold the fall neighborhood clean up on November 6, 1999 at 7 a.m. The meeting place will be the corner of 17th Avenue and Indian School. We will be doing the trash pickup of the perimeter of the neighborhood. Everyone is encouraged to come out and help take care of your neighborhood.

General Meeting Wrap Up - The overall feeling of the August General Meeting was that it was very successful. Over 80 people attended even without the air conditioning

working that evening. The sign up for the surveying was also said to be very successful

Other - Pastor Wilfong announced that Fred Taylor will be the speaker at the noon Adult Forum/Feedback. Look for details in this newsletter.

Meeting was adjourned at 9:39am. The next Board meeting will be held on October 9, 1999. Please check with any Board member as to location.


