# Minute to Minute

The January 13, 2001 Board Meeting was called to order at 9:03 a.m. in the Fireside Room at Martin Luther School, 1830 W Glenrosa. All Board members were present except for Sharon Barger.

The minutes from the December Board meeting were accepted with one clarification correction. The financial reports were accepted as submitted.

- Project 301 2000 The alley lighting committee has not met yet. Betty Dales and Faye Robbins have volunteered to also be on the committee. They will be touring the neighborhood selecting the poles for the budgeted lights. There are currently seven people interested in the security doors. A drawing will be held at the General Meeting to select the winners.
- Fire Department Grant The committee has obtained an accurate count of the houses in the neighborhood. The final writing of the application is to be done this month. If the grant is approved, a procedure to distribute the safety kits will be worked out.
- Project 301 2001 The committee has met and come up with some ideas for next years grant. They will be asking for addition alley lighting. The Board discussed that to get the additional lights with this grant would be beneficial. In 2002, funding will have to be requested to continue to power the lights obtained in the 1999 grant application. They will finalize which items are being requested and present the application at the next Board Meeting.
- Community Update Pastor Wilfong reported that the Volvo dealership has committed to staying at their present location. The construction on Camelback Road has begun.
- January General Meeting The committee reported that everything is ready for the meeting. The City Recycling department will be speaking. The nomination for Board Members will take place.
- Board Vacancy There is currently one neighbor interested in the open position. The announcement will run in this issue of the newsletter. It will be announced at the General Meeting. The deadline for volunteers will be January 31<sup>st</sup>. If no one else has volunteered, the interested neighbor will be invited to join the Board at the February meeting. If there are more interested, the Board will select a new member at the February meeting with that neighbor joining the Board in March.

Spring Neighborhood Clean up – February 17 at 7 a.m.


Annual Yard Sale - April 21

### The 3 R's of Neighborliness

**RIGHTS:** You have the right to engage in whatever behavior you like (as long as it isn't criminal.) That right ends, however, at the boundaries of your property. With regard to noise, for example your right to make noise ends where your neighbor's right to peace and quiet begins.

**RESPONSIBILITIES:** You are responsible for your own behavior and also for the behavior of those who visit your house. And, you and your visitors have the responsibility to behave in a fashion that befits the neighborhood where you are. For example, loud inconsiderate behavior may be tolerated on University campuses, but in a residential neighborhood of widows, working professionals and families, such behavior is completely inappropriate.

**RESPECT:** Neighbors need to treat each other in a respectful fashion. In order to know what behavior is respectful and what is not, you need to think of how your behavior might affect others. If you are unsure, ask your neighbors if they find your behavior respectful rather than expecting them to tell you if it is or not. Again, it is your responsibility to fit into your neighborhood – not your neighbors' responsibility to adjust to you.

#### This Month is Bulk Trash Pick up!!



There is another bulk trash pick up scheduled for February 2001. Trash should only be put out between the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> of this month. Homes with alley access should place items there, along their fence or block wall. Homes without alley access should place items at the edge of their yard, keeping sidewalks clear. #### KITCHEN SINK COOKIES

This Recipe makes about 4 dozen cookies. Even though the ingredient list may seem about as long as a grocery list, they're simple to make. In fact, these cookies are so basic you can mix everything by hand.

1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, softened

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup firmly packed light-brown sugar

2 large eggs

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 cups old-fashioned rolled oats

2 cups semisweet chocolate chips


1 cup sweetened flake coconut

1 cup raisins

1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts







Preheat oven to 350°.

In a large bowl, beat butter, sugar and brown sugar together until smooth and creamy, about 2 minutes. Beat in eggs, one at a time, until well blended.

Stir in vanilla.

In a medium bowl, sift together flour, baking soda, baking powder and salt. Gradually stir into butter mixture until well blended. Add oats, chips, coconut, raisins, and walnuts, and stir until well blended.

Drop batter by heaping tablespoons or with a 1 ounce ice-cream scoop onto baking sheets about 2 inches apart. Press tops down with the bottom of a glass to flatten cookies evenly. Bake until golden, about 16 to 18 minutes. Cool on pan for 2 minutes. Remove from pan, and finish cooling completely on wire rack.
