Neighborhood Block Watch Grant by Mark Day

The Bel Air Neighborhood Association was recently awarded a 2009 Neighborhood Block Watch Grant by the City of Phoenix Police Department. The Association applied for the \$7,312 grant on behalf of the neighborhood earlier this year. The Neighborhood Block Watch Grant Program (NBWGP) provides an opportunity to enhance the safety and the quality of life in our neighborhood and it helps the Association to prevent and solve crimerelated problems in our neighborhood.

The NBWGP was created to provide funding to neighborhood groups to undertake new and innovative programs and activities aimed at preventing and reducing crime in the community. The aim and purpose of the Neighborhood Block Watch Grant Program are to detect, deter, and/or delay crime. This is done by educating individuals to work together to solve problems, encouraging citizens to develop a sense of ownership for their neighborhoods, developing and addressing common neighborhood goals, coordinating pertinent neighborhood/community meetings, and teaching crime prevention and safety techniques.

Alley or Street Light Out?

If you notice an alley or street light out in the neighborhood, please contact Mark Day so it can be reported to APS. It is helpful if you can provide the pole ID# and street or alley location. Mark can be contacted at (602) 791-4003 or markdday@cox.net. With this funding, we are able to continue the efforts of the residents and the Association board to continue to build a sense of community and prevent and deter crime in our neighborhood. For example, we would be required to have all of the residents pay for the electricity costs for our alley lights. These lights cost over \$3,500 annually.

Block Watch Grant Account:

For the grant award period (July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010), funding was provided to meet the following objectives:

- Hold 3 General/Block Watch neighborhood meetings
- Prepare and distribute 6 newsletters per year
- Organize the annual GAIN event
- Funding for the electricity costs for all of our alley lights for one year
- Hold annual neighborhood yard/garage sale
- Organize an annual neighborhood clean-up
- Establish on-line version of newsletter

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Yard of the Quarter Award

The goal of the Yard of the Quarter Award is to recognize the efforts of Bel Air neighborhood residents who take pride in their home and landscape and inspire others to do the same.

AWARD RULES:

- 1. Yard of the Quarter will be awarded for the quarters of July September, October December, January March and April June.
- 2. Each yard is limited to winning the award only once in any calendar year.
- 3. Only the portion of the yard viewed from the street, will be judged.
- 4. A Yard of the Quarter sign will be placed in the winning yard and is to remain for the first two weeks after the award is given.
- 5. In the event they are selected, a homeowner may elect to refrain from participation.
- 6. Members of the Preservation Committee and Bel Air Board are ineligible to receive the award.

PRIZE:

All award winners will receive an official "Bel Air Yard

of the Quarter" lawn sign, to be placed on their property for the first two weeks after awarded. In addition, the award recipient will receive one Bel Air style lawn

chair.

NOMINATIONS:

- Bel Air residents can nominate a Bel Air property during the quarterly general meeting or by submitting the name and address of the nominated party to a Preservation committee member.
- 2. The preservation committee members can also nominate a property in the neighborhood.

Yard of the Quarter Award (cont.)

JUDGING CRITERIA:

- 1. General upkeep of the yard
- 2. Unique landscaping or originality/creativity
- 3. Pleasant and overall appearance which makes the property an asset to the neighborhood.
- 4. Property can be maintained by the homeowner or a professional landscape company
- 5. Buildings, fences, porches, and patios on the property are required to be in good repair, i.e. minimal distraction from the landscape due to deterioration, damage or construction.
- Extra consideration may given to properties that have invested extra effort through the use of attractive art pieces (eg. pottery, ironwork), potted plants, patio or lawn furniture, windsocks, etc.
- 7. All selected properties must be free of litter, junk and debris.
- 8. All selected properties must have no appliances or indoor furniture on porches or patios.
- 9. All selected properties must be free of junked or inoperable vehicles.
- 10. All selected properties must have no parking on the lawn.

City of Phx. Neighborhood Services Dept. Home Improvement & Repair Programs

The City of Phoenix Neighborhood Services Department offers several loan and grant programs designed to help residents meet code requirements and improve the safety, comfort, appearance and value of their homes.

Home improvement and repair is an important element in the city's strategy to improve and revitalize neighborhoods.

Loans and grants are available to Phoenix residents who meet program income requirements. Applicants will be asked to provide the city with financial information to determine eligibility. The information is confidential and will not be used for any other purpose.

WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM The Weatherization Assistance Program is a grant to im-

The Weatherization Assistance Program is a grant to improve a home's energy efficiency. This program provides for the replacement of existing building components and improvements to reduce energy consumption.

After an application is received and eligibility is established, the city will conduct an energy audit of the home. The auditor will determine the improvements that will be covered by the program. Common improvements include:

- Weather-stripping
- Caulking
- Insulation and duct sealing
- Repairing or replacing air conditioners, heat pumps, evaporative coolers, furnaces, or space heaters.

The city has a list of licensed, bonded contractors that will be invited to bid on the work. The contractor who submits the lowest bid will perform the work.

EMERGENCY HOME REPAIR PROGRAM

The Emergency Home Repair Program provides grants and loans to correct conditions posing a serious threat to the health, safety and welfare of the household and affecting the immediate livability of the home. Examples of emergencies that may be covered under the program include:

- Lack of running water or heating/cooling (seasonal)
- Exposed/hazardous electrical wiring
- Seriously damaged roofs

• Structural deficiencies posing an immediate safety threat Assistance will be granted based on the severity of the emergency, once eligibility is determined. Eligibility will be determined after a diagnostic evaluation is conducted by a rehabilitation specialist and/or licensed contractor.

The property must have been owner occupied during the last year.

HARDSHIP ASSISTANCE PROGRAM is another Neighborhood Services Department program. FOR MORE INFORMATION,
